WELCOME TO PUNTA CANA

The sophisticated East Coast of Dominican Republic attracts vacationers from around the world who come to explore and savor the luxuries of Punta Cana. Nestled across 100 miles (160 kilometers) of the world's top beaches lapped by turquoise waters and dotted with swaying palm trees, Punta Cana is Dominican Republic's most lavish and popular destination.

Your inspiration begins at touchdown, where the picture-perfect coastline beckons with a seemingly endless strip of frost-white sand shelving into reef-protected lagoons of irresistible peacock blues and greens. These silvery sands stretch virtually unbroken for 40 miles (64 kilometers) and are the reason for Dominican Republic's astonishing assemblage of all-inclusive hotels and convention centers.

Punta Cana's beaches and resorts may be its biggest draw, but its world-renowned golf courses and entertainment, like swimming with dolphins and zip lining through the exotic vegetation, promise to capture your imagination and refresh your soul.

To the north of Punta Cana is the equally luxe resort area of Bávaro. Together, Bávaro and Punta Cana feature Dominican Republic's largest hotel and resort infrastructure. Year after year, this region, where the Atlantic meets the Caribbean Sea, has been the venue for international fishing competitions and has also become the number one golf destination in the Caribbean, among the top in the world.

PUNTA CANA

FACTS

Dominican Republic occupies the eastern two-thirds of the large island of Hispaniola, which it shares with the Republic of Haiti, and is the second largest country in the Caribbean, comprising an area of 19,279 square miles (48,442 square kilometers). The country has a population of more than 9.5 million and enjoys sunny tropical weather all year. The average year-round temperatures are 78°F to 88°F (25°C to 31°C). The cooler season is November through April, while it is warmest from May through October.

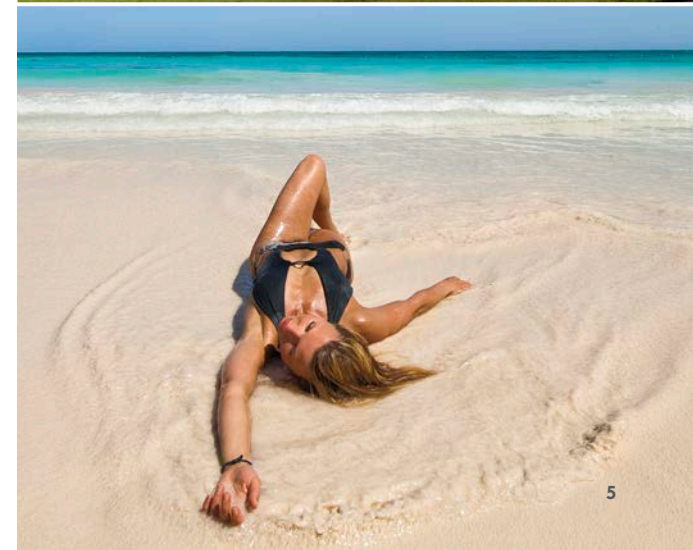
TIME: The local time zone is Eastern Caribbean Time (GMT -0400). Dominican Republic does not observe daylight savings time.

CAPITAL CITY: Dominican Republic's historic and sophisticated capital city, Santo Domingo, is the oldest city of the New World and its Colonial City was declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1990.

LANGUAGE: Spanish is the official language, however, you'll be surprised by the fact that the majority of employees in hotels and tourist destinations speak relatively good English, French, German and Italian.

CURRENCY: The Dominican peso (RD\$) is the official currency.

GETTING HERE: Dominican Republic currently has eight international airports throughout the country, including: Punta Cana International Airport (PUJ), Las Americas International Airport (SDQ) in Santo Domingo, La Romana International Airport (LRM), Gregorio Luperón International Airport (POP) in Puerto Plata, El Cibao International Airport (STI) in Santiago, and El Catey International Airport (AZS) in Samaná. Maritime ports that regularly receive cruise ships in the country include: Santo Domingo Port (Don Diego and Sans Souci terminals), Casa de Campo Port in La Romana and Samaná Bay facilities.





DOCUMENTATION: For most visitors, a valid passport along with a US\$10 Tourist Card (available online or at the airport) is required to enter the country. Any person, no matter their nationality, can enter with a Tourist Card if they are a legal resident or if they have one of the following valid visas in their passport: United States, Canada, United Kingdom or Schengen. ELECTRICITY: Operates at 110 Volts/60 Hertz, the same as North America.

TAXES: Dominican hotels and restaurants collect 28 percent of their published prices (18 percent sales tax + 10 percent service charge).

MEDICAL PRECAUTIONS: Because of the strength of the Caribbean sun and the climatic conditions of the area, it is recommended that vacationers always wear sunscreen and mosquito repellent when outdoors, and drink water throughout the day to avoid dehydration. Only bottled water is advised.

DRINKING AGE: The legal drinking age in the country is 18 years old.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

As the second largest country in the Caribbean, Dominican Republic offers a wide range of activities which can be a short or long distance away from one another. Many options exist for traveling on well-maintained highways to nearby attractions and also to more distantly located excursions.

BUS COMPANIES: Air conditioned motor coaches and vans arranged by local tour operators are available from most hotels. Also, daily service is available between Punta Cana/ Bávaro and Santo Domingo with the company Expreso Bávaro. www.expresobavaro.com

CAR RENTALS: Car rental offices and facilities can be found at the airports. Renters must be 25 with a valid driver's license.

BY PLANE: Punta Cana International Airport (PUJ), the country's largest and most popular airport, serves the Punta Cana and Bávaro regions. Many hotels are only a 10 – 35 minute taxi ride from the airport. For domestic flights, contact www.dominicanshuttles.com and www.aircentury.com

GROUND TRANSPORTATION: Taxis are available at most hotels and tour operators are more than willing to provide additional options for getting around. Visitors should also check with their hotel for any recommendations.



BEACHES



The main draw to the luxurious and exotic area of Punta Cana are the pristine beaches that stretch more than 40 miles (64 kilometers) and border the meeting point between the Atlantic Ocean and the Caribbean Sea. The multi-shaded blue waters are complemented by pristine white sands and create lasting impressions for all beach goers.

PUNTA CANA: Punta Cana is any beach lover's dream with its glorious white sand lined with palms and lapped by turquoise waters. Punta Cana's sands stretch for 3 miles (4.8 kilometers) and visitors can enjoy lunch on the beach at Playa Blanca, a beach restaurant open daily to the public and often frequented by Oscar de la Renta and Julio Iglesias.

PLAYA BLANCA: This beach is part of Puntacana Resort & Club's gated community, but admission is free for those heading to the popular Playa Blanca Restaurant or that have booked kitesurfing lessons at The Kite Club. For those looking to brush up on their skills, professional kitesurfing and SUP surfing instruction is offered at this extensive white sand beach by certified Puntacana Resort & Club staff.

CABEZA DE TORO: Cabeza de Toro Beach's "Blue Flag" European certification guarantees that the beach is always in fantastic shape and therefore is a popular beach for tourists. Cabeza de Toro Yacht Club is a departure point for fishing trips and fishing tournament sites.

BÁVARO: The most developed section of the East Coast resort strip, Bávaro, is dotted with hotels, restaurants and gift shops right on the beach. The area is one strip of sparkling white sand that extends 30 miles (48 kilometers) surrounded by coral reefs. Most of this stretch of beach is walkable and is the perfect place to book beach activities, ranging from parasailing to speed-boat riding.

UVERO ALTO: Located at the northern-most end of Punta Cana, this fine bronze-colored sand beach allows you to either enjoy open areas with large waves or calm waters protected by reefs, depending on the part of the beach you visit.

MACAO: Declared by UNESCO as one of the best beaches in the Caribbean, Macao is a public beach located 20 to 30 minutes away from most hotels. Surfing classes are available if the conditions are appropriate and various shacks serving refreshments and food can be found along the beach.

EL CORTECITO-LOS CORALES: With no access restrictions, El Cortecito Beach and Los Corales, in the heart of Bávaro, is like a small fisherman's village where you will find restaurants, bars, supermarkets, shopping centers and many gift and craft shops nearby. Many sea excursions depart from this beach.

JUANILLO: Juanillo Beach at Cap Cana offers miles of pristine, white sand beaches with turquoise waters so clear that it is often referred to one of the best beaches in Dominican Republic. A wide selection of tropical food and drinks and formal events and concerts are available at Juanillo Beach as well as beach activities such as volleyball, snorkeling, kite surfing, kayaking and horseback riding.



ATTRACTIONS

CAP CANA HARBOR & MARINA: The largest world-class marina in the Caribbean, Cap Cana Harbor & Marina is designed to be the most complete and modern one in the area where, in waters just beyond the Marina, you can experience some of the best angling in the Caribbean. The facility features 1,200 slips handling yachts up to 250 feet long (75 meters) and is equipped with meteorological buoyancy services unique to the Caribbean. When operating, the buoy measures wind and sea conditions, which are transmitted to the crews. Other facilities include government authorities such as harbor officials and customs departments, wireless internet and courtesy shuttle services. www.capcana.com

PUNTACANA RESORT & CLUB MARINA: The full-service marina is located at the Puntacana Resort & Club. With two docks and mooring for 43 yachts up to 70 feet (21 meters) LOA, the marina is well-liked by big game fishermen and is one of the most popular areas to hold billfish tournaments in Dominican Republic. The established marina includes a swimming pool, restaurant, cable television, telephone, laundry facilities, ice bags and drinking water. www.puntacana.com

INDIGENOUS EYES ECOLOGICAL PARK: The southern end of Punta Cana harbors more than 500 species of exotic plants and trails that snake along 11 natural lagoons, each with a unique name

from the native Taino language, in the Indigenous Eyes Ecological Park. The park has 1,500 acres (600 hectares) set aside as conservation land and is owned and managed by the Puntacana Ecological Foundation. The reserve is also categorized as a “transition zone sub-tropical forest” due to the flora and fauna exhibiting characteristics of both the dry and humid sub-tropical forests. The reserve, owned by the Puntacana Resort & Club, is open to the public daily from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and guided tours are also offered. www.puntacana.org

DOLPHIN ISLAND PARK: Located between the beach and coral barrier of Bávaro, Dolphin Island Park takes visitors swimming with the delicate and graceful sea animals in the midst of their natural habitat. Trained professionals boat visitors out to a platform where they can snorkel, swim and take pictures with dolphins, sharks, stingrays and sea lions. www.dolphinislandpark.com

MANATI PARK: Tropical birds, reptiles and animal entertainment shows are dispersed throughout this 80-square-mile (210-square-kilometer) attraction, centered in magnificent gardens abundant with orchids and tropical plants. The park and its exhibits feature an insight into Dominican culture, folklore and artistry of the Taino Indians, the island’s inhabitants at the time of the Spanish conquest. www.manatipark.com

MARINARIUM: The Marinarium is the perfect tour for lovers of swimming and the wonders that are hidden in the marine world. Marinarium is an experience that allows you to enjoy and rediscover the beauty of coral reefs, as well as swimming with nurse sharks and stingrays. Excursions set off from the company’s Cabeza de Toro base. www.marinarium.com





SEAQUARIUM: This underwater walking adventure tour lets visitors get up close and personal with sea creatures. Discover colorful tropical fish, friendly sting rays, amazing corals, sunken objects and more with the help of a guide, special breathing helmet and your own two feet.

SIRENIS AQUAGAMES: Located at the Sirenis Cocotal Beach Resort Casino & Spa and the Sirenis Tropical Suites Casino & Spa, Sirenis Aquagames covers 14,400 square yards (11,200 square meters) and offers fun entertainment and slides for the entire family. The park includes a swimming pool, 4-land speed slides, a tower with multiple water tubes, two open toboggans and much more.

BÁVARO ADVENTURE PARK: Ideal for those seeking an adrenaline rush, Bávaro Adventure Park offers nature-friendly and sustainable activities such as ziplining, a climbing garden, a Segway circuit, paintball, a bungee trampoline, flight simulators, a mountain bike track and more. It also includes a Jurassic Park, featuring more than 20 animatronic dinosaurs within a natural setting. The park operates to meet world-class standards and provides guests with knowledgeable international and multilingual staff, each with the proper certification. The park is open daily from 8:30 a.m. – 6:30 p.m.

SCAPE PARK: Located at world-class Cap Cana, Scape Park includes the top tourist, athletic, cultural and entertainment activities within the property. The area's design and architecture create a versatile array of landscapes that provide attractions for travelers of all ages. Activities here include a zipline eco-tour, adventure buggies, Hoyo Azul Natural Lagoon, water activities, horseback riding and more. The park's latest attraction, the Cave Expedition, takes visitors on a hike up the El

Farallon Cliff and into the vast underground network of chambers and tunnels below. www.ScapePark.com

DEEP SEA FISHING: The waters surrounding Punta Cana and Bávaro are some of the best spots in the world for deep sea fishing and are regarded as one of the world's top five billfish areas. For this reason, annual tournaments attract international participants during the summer months. At the end of October, the waters are calm enough to fish for mahi-mahi, tuna, mackerel, swordfish, blue marlin, barracuda and dorado among others.

SPAS: Whether it is for a girlfriend getaway, a romantic trip for two or a stress-relief holiday from the hustle and bustle, a visit to Punta Cana and Bávaro's all-inclusive resorts and spa facilities is an ideal way to decompress. The world-class properties specialize in some of today's hottest and most luxurious spa services.

SHOPPING: Visitors can embrace the lifestyle of the rich and famous in Punta Cana or seek out Dominican Republic souvenirs at local shops. Upscale boutiques can be found at places like Puntacana Village, Palma Real Shopping Village and San Juan Shopping Center, while local vendors and shops can be found scattered along beaches, such as Plaza Bibijagua at Bávaro Beach. Traditional Dominican products like amber, larimar, ceramic dolls, chocolate, coffee, rum, cigars, macadamia nuts, merengue music and more can be bought from these local stands.

NIGHTLIFE: Effervescent nightlife and world-class gambling can be found at most resorts throughout the region, and are a great way to unwind after a day filled with adventure. You can experience the nightlife of Punta Cana like a local at one of many discos and





nightspots, such as Oro, Mangú, Pachá, Dux and Jewel. Also at the Puntacana Village you can find a large variety of bars and restaurants, which can be lively or laid back to suit your style. Partygoers can also enjoy a mystical night of dancing and animation in an unparalleled location at Imagine Nightclub, a club dispersed throughout a network of caves spanning 115,500 feet (35,000 meters).

RESTAURANTS: Punta Cana offers a wide selection of restaurants ranging from family-friendly to romantic, many of them by the beach. Popular options include Poseidón, La Yola, Capitán Cook, Jellyfish, Huracán Café, and Noah among others, as well as a variety of places to enjoy at The Puntacana Village.

HIGÜEY: Located less than an hour away from the resort area, Higüey was founded in 1494 by Spanish colonist Juan de Esquivela. A city deep in history, Higüey was originally one of the Taino Kingdoms that occupied the land and is a great way to better understand the Dominican way of life. Higüey is home to the basilica in honor of Our Lady of Altagracia, Patroness of the Dominican Republic, as well as the Basilica Museum that reflects the Catholic history and cultural expressions of the Dominican people in their piety to the Virgin Mary. The museum is open Tues. – Sun. from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

BOCA DE YUMA: Situated an hour southwest of Punta Cana, this hidden paradise remains a humble village surrounded by beautiful beaches. Boca de Yuma is an authentic fishing village that used to be a favorite hangout for pirates, most notably Roberto Cofresí. High coral bluffs surround the bay that is home to a fleet of small colorful fishing boats and wildlife such as iguanas, pelicans and seabirds.

EXCURSIONS



The delightful attractions around the Punta Cana region are at your fingertips. For these tours and more, please contact your hotel's tour desk or representative.

INLAND SAFARIS: Jeep, truck and 8-wheel military truck in-country safari tours are offered at all resort hotels. These high vehicles take you inland across rivers and rough terrain using one of several routes, usually traveling through jungles and sugarcane plantations, stopping for a refreshing swim in a river or at an unspoiled beach, enjoying a Dominican food buffet, listening to typical “perico ripiao” music, visiting a small village with a stopover at the local “colmado” (grocery store), and taking an inside peek into a country home for a cup of home-brewed Dominican coffee.

CARIBBEAN BUCCANEERS: The perfect show for the whole family, Pirates of the Caribbean style. Enter an authentic pirate village, board the pirate vessel, and celebrate with a spectacular feast and a pirate toast with rum. Open on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the show starts at 6 p.m. and transportation is available and complimentary from most hotels.

ALTOS DE CHAVÓN: Half an hour away you will find La Romana's hidden gem, Altos de Chavón. This replica of a 16th-century European artists' village offers winding cobblestone streets lined by beautiful coral block and terra cotta buildings. Overlooking a magnificent scenic view of the Chavón River, the village is home to a handful of bars, restaurants, art galleries and shops, as well as the St. Stanislaus Church and a Grecian-style amphitheater. www.casadecampo.com.do



CARIBBEAN FESTIVAL: Enjoy the crystal-clear waters, snorkeling, open bar and Caribbean rhythms onboard Caribbean Festival, a double-decker catamaran with a glass bottom used to explore underwater marine life. Check out the baby sharks and stingrays at the Stingray Bay Aquarium or take a sunset cruise to get an ocean view of all the resorts lined up along the coastline. Many of these trips are billed as “party boats” for the open bar and nonstop music on board.

BEACH BUGGY & QUAD ADVENTURES: Macao beach territory, to the north of most Punta Cana resorts, is chosen for the many beach buggy, quad adventure (4-wheel ATV motorbikes) and other off-road excursions that put the tourist behind the wheel. The beach buggy vehicle provides the smoothest ride of those that take you inland through rugged territory, with time for racing across the sands of the expansive Macao beach.

ZIPLINE & CANOPY TOURS: Fly across the magnificent Anamuya River, where a nature guide will lead the way in this adventure to unlock the secrets of the Taino Anamuya Mountains. Get an adrenaline rush as you ride the zip lines through exuberant vegetation to explore sugarcane fields or hike into the real jungle following the Anamuya River. www.bavarorunners.com

HORSEBACK RIDING: Several hotels feature horseback riding excursions that take tourists into the hillsides and to seldom-visited beaches.

MACAO SURF CAMP: Macao Surf Camp at Macao Beach is the best place for anyone looking to learn how to surf. The camp provides learners with step-by-step lessons that are targeted on improving your individual technique. The camp is open daily from 9 a.m. – 6 p.m.



SAONA ISLAND: Saona Island, separated from dry land by the Catuano Channel, is the most popular excursion taken by tourists visiting the Punta Cana area. Part of the National Park of the East and voted as one of the Caribbean’s Top Dream Beaches by Caribbean Travel & Life, Saona Island’s unspoiled beaches, lush palms and turquoise water make it one of Dominican Republic’s most enchanted regions. Boat tours depart from neighboring town Bayahibe.

LA FLOR DOMINICANA CIGAR FACTORY: Located in La Estancia, La Romana, visitors can appreciate the pride and hard work of the most experienced cigar crafters. On this tour you can learn from the aging cellar of the cigar, its preparation, blends, handcrafting and the final packaging. The exclusive cigar shop offers the best selection and prices for premium Dominican tobacco, including La Flor Dominicana, the most recognized Dominican premium cigar from the last decade. The factory is open daily from 8 a.m – 7 p.m. www.cigarcountrytours.com

FUN FUN CAVE: Thrill seekers can rappel down into a mysterious cave and explore sections of its underground caverns that are joined by a 4 mile (7 kilometer) long subterranean river flowing within. Be sure to look at the walls, as they are decorated with displays of cave paintings by the Tainos. Visitors can ride to the cave on horseback and can even descend 55 feet (16 meters) into the entrance of Los Haitises National Park. It is a full day excursion. www.cuevafunfun.net

HELICOPTER TOURS: Discover the beauty of Punta Cana from the air, taking in panoramic flight views of the exotic landscapes. A truly unique and unforgettable experience.





MONKEY LAND: The excursion commences with a walk through stunning botanical gardens decorated with medicinal plants, flowers and native fruit trees. The guided tour continues with feeding and interacting with dozens of squirrel monkeys in their natural environment. Although trained, the monkeys are easily amused by shiny materials such as cameras and jewelry. At the end of the excursion, visitors will enjoy organic coffee, cacao and tropical fruits at a typical Dominican village. www.RunnersAdventures.com

OCEAN SPA DR. FISH: Indulge in one-of-a-kind pampering with Dominican Republic's Dr. Fish Ocean Spa. The three-hour excursion provides a new level of relaxation with Bio Pilates, floating mattresses, a foot detox, massages, stretching and more on a sailing spa boat. The highlighted service is the Dr. Fish experience, which includes a foot exfoliation by tiny Garra Rufa fish. The fish remove the foot's dead skin, leaving your feet soft and rejuvenated. PUNTA CANA CARNIVAL: Visitors and locals alike celebrate The Punta Cana Carnival in Puntacana Village each March. The annual parade features carnival troops from throughout the country, costumed characters and live performances. 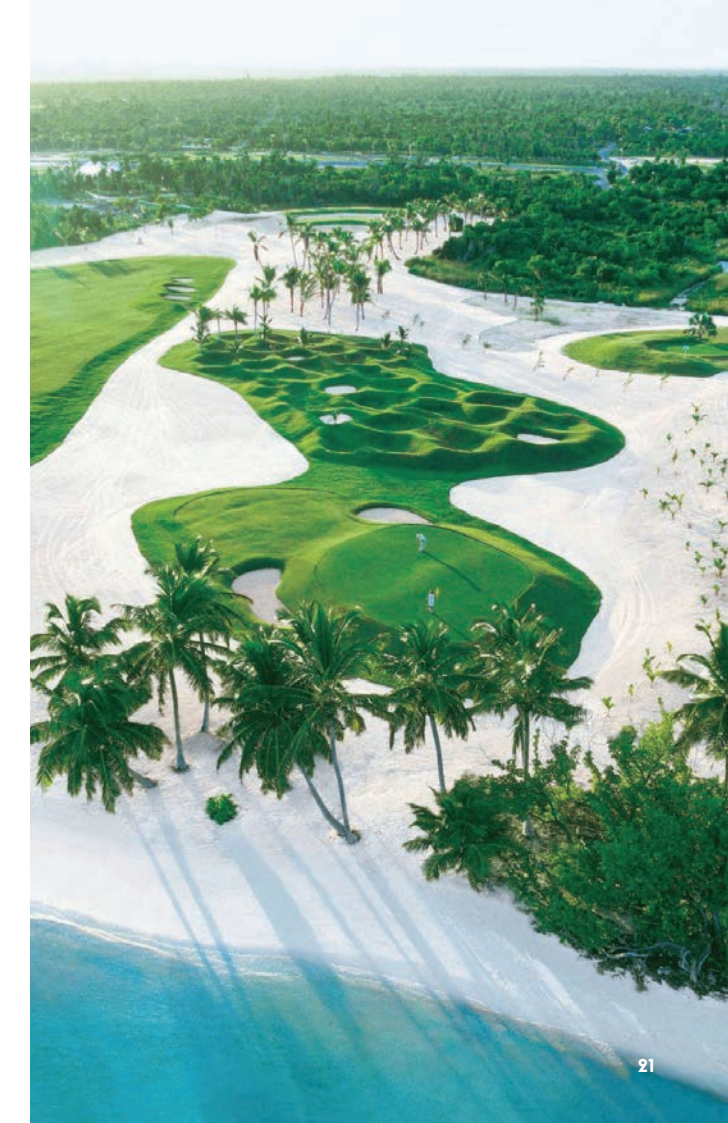
